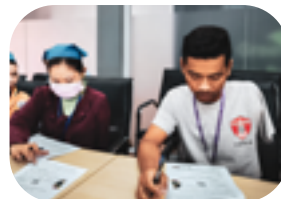

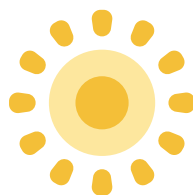

As we approach the remarkable milestone of AIP Foundation's 25th anniversary, your unwavering support has allowed us to grow as a coalition-builder and catalyst to transform mobility through equity, sustainability, and health.

I am thrilled to share some critical lessons that have driven our work this year:

The only way forward is together. We celebrated several milestones in our effort to promote safer journeys to school. Our *Safe School Zone Guide* was endorsed by Vietnam's Ministry of Transport – providing policymakers with a blueprint to improve the safety of school zones across the country. Our successes are built on a foundation of dedicated individuals and organizations who share our vision. From our partnerships across regions and sectors, to our empowered team who tirelessly advance our cause, every accomplishment that AIP Foundation has achieved is shared among the community that works alongside us.

Change begins with listening. We were proud to influence critical legislation across the region – including in Cambodia, which announced its commitment to reduce school speed limits to 30 kilometers per hour. A core objective of our work is to serve as a bridge between decision-makers and the community. We organized forums for young people to engage with policymakers and empowered factory workers with the skills and knowledge to advocate for the right to commute to work safely. Our efforts begin by building an authentic understanding of the experiences, hopes, and struggles of our beneficiaries.

Young people are ready to contribute. One of the cornerstones of our success has been our dedication to empowering youth as catalysts of change. Young people are not just the recipients of our work; they are active partners. This year, we collaborated with young leaders to launch a Youth Engagement App to promote youth participation in community development. Within AIP Foundation, my young colleagues continuously inspire me with their passion and creativity, which allows us to innovate and evolve as an organization. Young people are already making waves around the world, and the time to shape our future alongside them is now.

While significant work remains in the global effort to halve road traffic deaths and injuries by 2030, I hope the examples of impact, lessons learned, and community stories included in this year's report serve as an essential reminder of our collective abilities to make a meaningful contribution – just as they have for me.

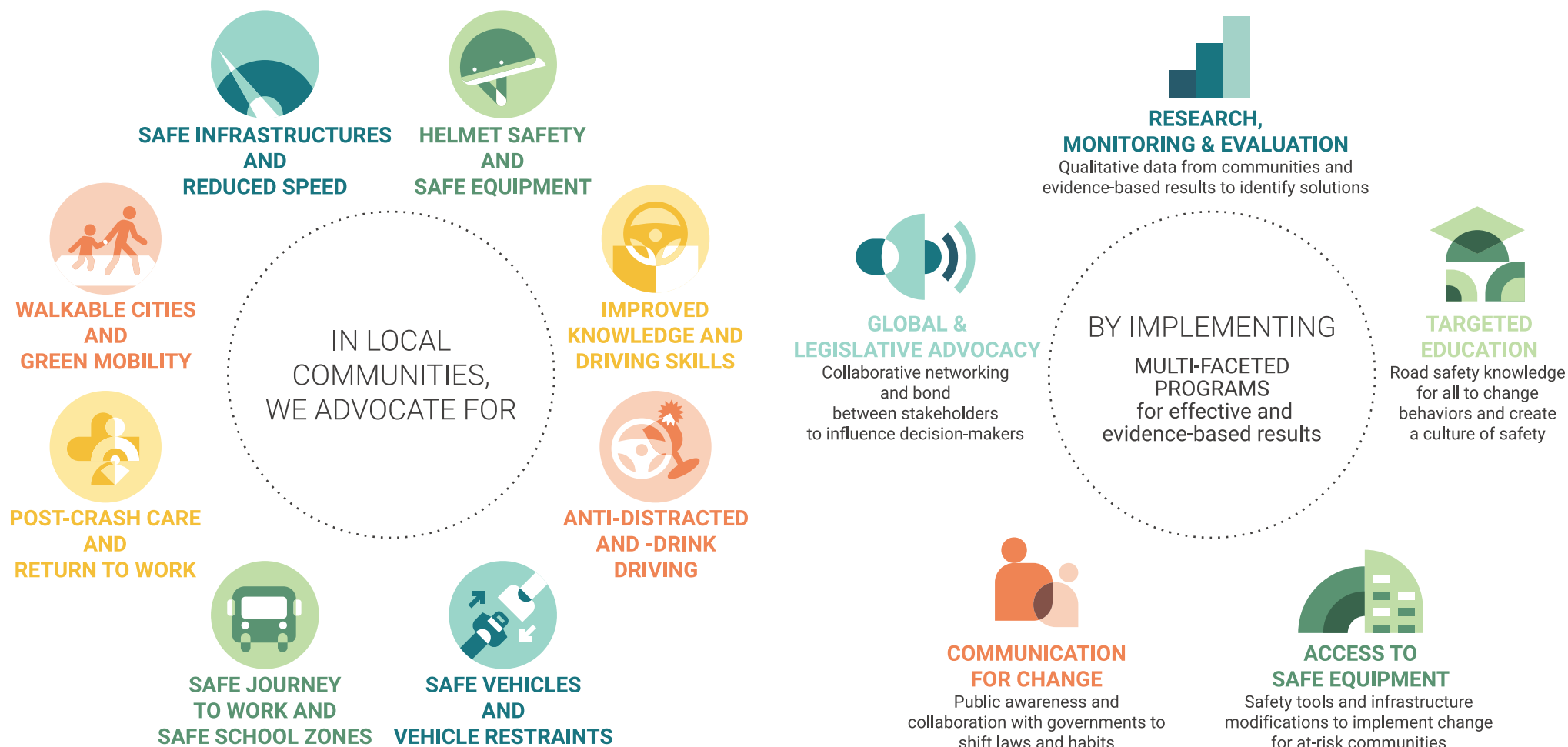

Everyone deserves to safely walk, cycle, take transit, drive through their communities and breathe clean air regardless of age, ethnicity, gender, ability, or background. It's not just a convenience; it's a biological requirement for human health and well-being. In Cambodia, where thousands of garment and footwear factory workers face perilous commutes, we focus on transitioning to safer transportation. Through our legacy across the Asia-Pacific region, we empower communities by advocating for greener mobility - providing solutions to decrease transport gas emissions for cleaner air to breathe.

FOSTERING INCLUSIVITY

From empowering women and advocating for gender equality to promoting safer commutes for low-income households and people from ethnic minority communities, our initiatives extend beyond schools and factories. AIP Foundation actively fosters inclusivity through collaboration with stakeholders from diverse sectors. This multi-sector collaboration ensures a holistic approach to sustainable mobility. AIP Foundation's inclusive strategies consider factors like gender and socio-economic backgrounds, ensuring its programs benefit entire communities.

FOCUSING ON YOUTH

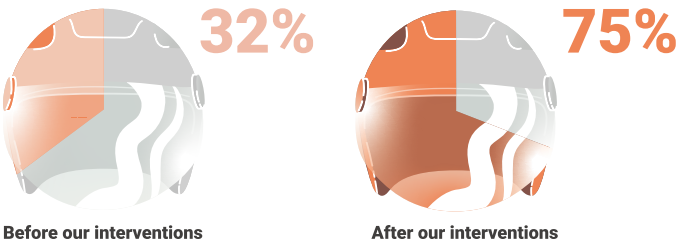
Our initiatives span from providing mobility education and solutions for primary students and parents to engaging youth as future leaders through training programs and innovative campaigns. In 2023, the first Youth Forum on Sustainable Mobility and Traffic Safety was held in Vietnam. Youth are also enabled to identify and report high-risk road conditions to decision-makers through a dedicated Youth Engagement App (Read "The Power of Data" page 17). In Thailand, our programs aim to enhance mobility advocacy leadership among teenagers and young adults (Read "The Power of Youth" page 16).

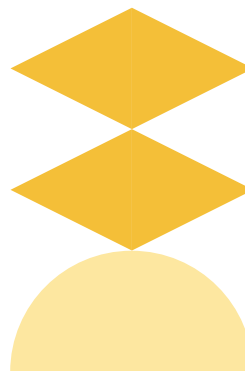

THE POWER OF YOUTH

TOMORROW'S LEADERS: TRANSFORMING THAILAND THROUGH YOUTH LEADERSHIP

With more than 17 million people under 18 years old, youth emerge as our most influential advocates for safe mobility in Thailand. As the country looks to the future, our programs focus on empowering youth ambassadors, to stand as beacons of hope, shaping a mobility landscape where the youth are architects of creating ripple effects throughout communities. During the 7th United Nations Global Road Safety Week, one hundred students of Songkhla Satun secondary school led road safety activities. They delivered inspirational messages to encourage their peers to become safe mobility ambassadors in their own communities. Before the event, students had analyzed the high-risk areas around the school and told decision-makers what actions needed to be taken to fix them.

THE POWER OF DATA

AI FOR GLOBAL GOALS: BRINGING YOUTH TO THE DECISION TABLE

In Vietnam, AIP Foundation harnesses the power of data and artificial intelligence to involve the youth in critical decision-making processes. *AI&Me: Empowering Youth for Safer Roads* is an innovative program that leverages AI and big data's transformative power to revolutionize mobility.

At the core of this initiative, the Youth Engagement App (YEA) enables young individuals to be active participants in shaping the safety of their communities. The YEA encourages students to identify and report high-risk road conditions. The data collected serves as actionable recommendations shared with the government for effective, evidence-based road safety interventions.

AIP Foundation received a monumental boost by being included in a USD\$2 million grant invested in AI for good initiatives in 2023. This game-changer for safer journeys was awarded to iRAP, with AIP Foundation as the Vietnam lead partner. Integrating AI, satellite imagery, and Street-View images will facilitate a country-wide star-rating evaluation of road infrastructure around schools, supporting targeted upgrades.

HUMAN RIGHTS

SAFEGUARDING DIGNITY, EMPOWERING LIVES

Mobility is a human right enabling access to other human rights such as education, work and leisure. Millions around the world are denied the fundamental right to mobility, a right we often take for granted. For them, freely moving from place to place is a critical pathway to opportunity and participation in society.

SUPPORTING UNIVERSAL VALUES

Fulfilling human safety needs - health, well-being, or financial security - relies on equitable access to transport. Without access to reliable transportation, individuals face barriers to education, healthcare, employment, and social connection. Children and youth are at the core of our local initiatives, with a global purpose to make school areas safer. In Cambodia, our aim to ensure that all workers safely commute to work can impact all the people and family members they support.

MOBILIZING WOMEN

From inclusive school programs in Vietnam to initiatives within the Cambodian workforce, AIP Foundation actively promotes women's rights and encourages female participation in advocating for safe mobility. The impact is seen not only in statistics but in the stories of women who have found their voice through our programs. One striking example is the 'Speak Up' campaign in Cambodia, launched to empower female workers to raise their concerns when transportation does not meet the safety needs of their peers.

JOINING VOICES

AIP Foundation believes in the strength of collective and diversified voices (Read "The Power of Collaboration" page 22). The collaborative efforts with communities and civil society demonstrate the power of collective action in addressing human rights challenges. Globally, we participated in the 1.8 Billion Young People for Change campaign and co-organized the "Driving Change: Youth Engagement for Improved Road Safety" session at the Global Forum for Adolescents.

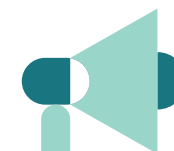

SUSTAINABILITY

— SHAPING TOMORROW'S MOBILITY TODAY

Sustainability is at the core of AIP Foundation's vision for the future of mobility. From rethinking mobility to advocating for lasting changes, AIP Foundation's commitment is demonstrated in initiatives that address current challenges and lay the groundwork for a resilient and greener future.

PROPOSING SOLUTIONS

Adaptation is vital to address the diverse challenges encountered in the countries we work in, together with addressing global issues. With an innovative mindset, we propose solutions as diverse as building the next generation of leaders, utilizing advanced technology, promoting soft mobility, as well as influencing laws and policies. In Vietnam, AIP Foundation's commitment to the country lies in proposing sustainable solutions that reshape infrastructure for long-term safer mobility. Implementing the *Safe School Zones Guide* pilot in Vietnam showcased our dedication to creating secure environments. In 2023, the Ministry of Transport issued an official letter recommending the *Safe School Zones Guide* Vietnam as the first national reference material on safe school zones (Read "The Power of Trust" page 23).

INFLUENCING LAWS

AIP Foundation's sustainability efforts extend beyond projects to influence entire countries toward legislative change for safer mobility practices. Beyond endorsement by the government, the *Safe School Zones Guide* serves as evidence to support legislation establishing a legal school zone definition in Vietnam (Directive 31). In Thailand, the appointment of AIP Foundation as a member of the Sub-Committee on Road Safety for Children

and Youth in Songkhla Province illustrates the trust of local government representatives. In Cambodia, we support the government's current road safety priorities of a 30km/h speed limit in school zones and safer transportation for factory workers.

RETHINKING MOBILITY

AIP Foundation envisions a future where mobility aligns with environmental sustainability. In Vietnam, AIP Foundation is multiplying initiatives to promote biking in schools, one of them mobilizing the national Ambassador for Earth Day and over 1,000 community members during the 7th UN Global Road Safety Week. In Cambodia, the ongoing *Eco-Safe* training of truck drivers showed that drivers could reduce fuel consumption. These efforts encourage alternative, eco-friendly transportation, reducing emissions and fostering healthier communities.

THE POWER OF COLLABORATION

BUILDING ON DIVERSITY TO ADDRESS COMMUTING SAFETY CHALLENGES

Every day, more than 800,000 Cambodian factory workers risk their lives commuting on perilous roads to go to work. The garment and textile sector faces challenges with unsafe transport, inadequate infrastructure, and a rise in inexperienced road users. Unsafe commuting to/from work is a heavy burden on the worker's life and the country's economy.

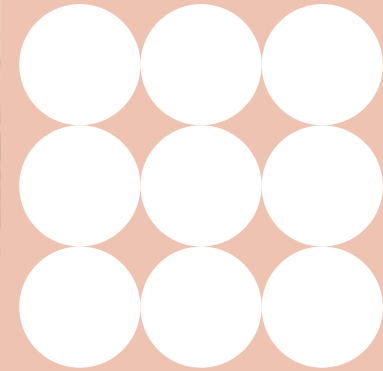
AIP Foundation's commitment to commuting safety shines in collaborative initiatives. With only one program - out of three factory-focused initiatives in Cambodia - AIP Foundation organized 274 joint actions with stakeholders. In 2023, best practices were shared at a national workshop, building on a "Declaration of Action" backed by the UN Secretary-General's Special Envoy for Road Safety. This declaration – endorsed by 35 trade unions, national and sub-national authorities, civil society organizations, media, factory owners, and brands – was presented to the Cambodian government and serves as a blueprint for collaborative actions that can be taken to ensure that workplaces comply with road safety rules and road traffic laws.

Regular coordination of stakeholders' discussions and field visits enables the emphasis on scalable mobility policies, with the formation of a government-non-government working group. Successful road safety policy implementation at factories has led to increased knowledge among workers and drivers, an increased helmet-wearing rate, and the transition from commuters standing in flat-bed trucks to safer vehicles, such as buses and vans. This collaborative approach contributes significantly to safer commutes, aligned with the government's recently revealed four-year action plan for workers with a particular focus on changing the existing unsafe means of transportation.

THE POWER OF TRUST

IMPORTANCE OF DATA DISSEMINATION WHEN ADVOCATING FOR POLICY CHANGE

In 2023, Vietnam celebrated the successful conclusion of the *Slow Zones, Safe Zones* program. After five years of implementation, 71% of target school zones in Pleiku City achieved the highest safety rating. Launched in 2018, the program not only made a local impact in Pleiku City but emerged as a global influencer, championing the Sustainable Development Goals and urging a paradigm shift in mobility with the hashtag #rethinkmobility. Bolstering this success, the government collaborated with AIP Foundation to create the national *Safe School Zones Guide* in 2021.

After receiving the official endorsement from the Ministry of Transport, the guide stands as a critical resource for safer school zones in Vietnam. It was presented to 63 Departments of Transportation for practical implementation across provinces, ensuring nationwide impact. In a national effort, the Prime Minister issued Directive 31, calling for joint actions from the Ministry of Transportation, the Ministry of Health, the Ministry of Public Security, and provincial authorities. By closing the gap between vision and implementation, AIP Foundation demonstrates the transformative power of coalition-building and data dissemination efforts in influencing broader mobility policies.

The journey from a local program to international influence is continuing. AIP Foundation and partners delivered a complimentary program in the Asia-Pacific region on how to collect data for school zone assessments with the Star Rating for Schools methodology - internationally acknowledged to guide decision-makers in adopting safe infrastructure and widely used in AIP Foundation mobility programs.

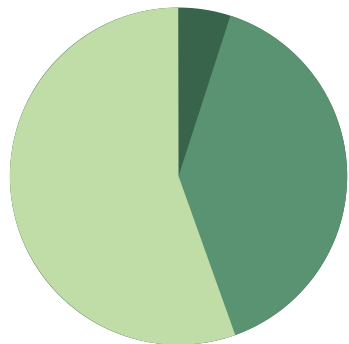
